

**TOWN OF EAST MONTPELIER ANNUAL TOWN MEETING  
March 5, 2024**

The meeting was called to order by Moderator, Michael Duane at 9:40 AM

ARTICLE 1: To elect all necessary officers for the ensuing year. (Australian Ballot results listed in **bold type**).

Town Moderator, 1-year term **Michael Duane – 870 votes**

The Moderator introduced all who were running for office

ARTICLE 2: Motion to discuss the report of the Selectboard was made by Michael Thompson and seconded by Ellen Knoedler. Mr. Gardner asked for volunteers to serve on the Planning Commission since there are two empty seats. The term is for three years for each seat. Mr. Gardner noted that the Selectboard report is on page 14 of the Annual Report.

- Moving through the report, he noted that the office transitions are due to life changes. The road crew staffing has been stable.
- Dealing with FEMA requirements has caused delays in getting those roads fixed. Ms. Estrin asked which roads still needed repair. Sanders Circle and Sodom Pond Road culverts has been fixed temporarily. Mr Barstow asked why the historic culvert at Sodom Pond Road was not going to be repaired. Town Administrator, Gina Jenkins, responded that the State has determined that the old structure needs to be replaced. Colin Blackwell mentioned that there are smaller culverts further down the road that could be affected.
- Ms. Knoedler found a five-dollar bill on the floor. If you've lost it, please see her.
- ARPA funding: Ginny Callan asked about the non-profit grant funding. Mr. Gardner said there were four organizations who applied for the \$50,000 available. The funds were disbursed as follows: Twin Valley received \$25,000; East Montpelier Trails received \$10,000; All Together Now \$10,000 for furnace; East Montpelier Historical Society - \$5,000 for cabinetry. Other items funded included a \$100,000 donation for CV Fiber, some were used to defray the tax burden, and some funding was allocated to the Capital Reserve Fund.
- The Selectboard also authorized \$40,000 of ARPA funding for the preliminary sketched plan for a new town garage facility. Informational meetings will be held with a possible bond vote. We have also hired an Owner's Representative to protect our interests. Mr. Shapiro, who is very invested in green energy, has been heavily involved in the process
- Albert Petrella is the new Fire Chief and can be reached if you have questions about ambulance and fire.

ARTICLE 3: Town Garage Discussion

Motion to discuss Article 3 was made by Hillary Farrington and seconded by Ellen Knoedler. Mr. Gardner reported that the physical building was built in the 1950s, no longer fits the town's needs and equipment doesn't physically fit within the structure. The building needs to be upgraded to reflect the updated needs. Ms. Christiansen noted that the equipment is literally parked inches away from walls and other equipment. Mr. Gardner responded to Ms. Miller's question about the role of an Owner's Representative. Mr. Gardner explained that the firm hired is VIS. Mr.

Shapiro will also be involved with the Selectboard in ensuring the project meets the town's needs and energy goals. Stephen Miracle noted that the proposal is to knock down the old building. He has concerns about whether that is the best way to proceed. He suggested exploring the purchase of a different parcel and ensuring there is space for working on and storing vehicles. He is also skeptical of the use of heat pumps and electricity to heat a new building. He reiterated that the Town explain to the architects exactly what we are looking for. Betsy Barstow wanted to know about the procedure for choosing the architect. Mr. Gardner explained the walk-through process. After submitting the RPF, there were four applications, which were narrowed down to the choice we made. Ms. Watson asked if the references had been checked and how does Guthrie Perry feel about it. TA Jenkins gave some context regarding the chosen architects. Mr. Perry conducted two site visits at other town garages that were designed by Weimann Lamphere & Associates. Chris Pratt, who is a contractor who works in energy efficiency and recommended a carbon analysis. Be performed He is concerned that new construction would be a higher carbon impact. Carole Dickson asked if materials in the building could be repurposed or reused. Mr. Gardner explained that it has not been discovered yet. Mr. Deegan mentioned that the Capitol Reserve Committee has been talking about the need for a new energy-efficient building for more than a decade. The goal of the CRC is to safeguard the assets (vehicles and equipment) of the town. Those assets need to be protected, and he supported the direction. Gene Troia echoed Mr. Deegan's thoughts. His experience as a contractor is that a new structure will best serve our purposes and be most protective of the tax base. He also suggested that a new structure be made large enough for future equipment. He asked if the Fire Department building would be taken down and asked that wastewater be addressed. Mr. Gardner has suggested combining space for the fire department with the town. This idea was not well received by the Fire Department but will be brought up again. Mr. Troia said tearing down the garage and the fire station garage may improve the site for repurposing. Is there a requirement by the State that sand piles be covered? Mr. Gardner responded that there is no requirement. Bruce Howlett asked about the scope of the project. He asked that a brief description of the project be placed on the website. Mr. Gardner noted that everything done so far is on the website. Ms. Watson suggested that public forums should be held and community information would be communicated. Mr. Gardner responded that this will occur. Ms. Miller asked to revisit the questions Mr. Miracle asked regarding the site. Mr. Gardner responded that a different site would cost more. If there are significant compromises, the cost will be far more. We will continue to explore other options for the site if needed. Mr. Barstow asked if there is a possibility of expanding the land footprint. Would the abutting owner be willing to sell more of it. Mr. Gardner noted that the town owns the wetlands and the town forest areas that are abutting the current site. There isn't a lot of land to gain that way.

ARTICLE 4: Shall the Town raise the sum of **\$2,261,263** as proposed by the Selectboard, for laying out and repairing highways and for other necessary Town expenses for fiscal year 2025 (July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025). The Article **PASSED**: 844 YES 134 NO.

ARTICLE 5: Shall the Town authorize all property taxes for the fiscal year 2025 to be paid to the Town Treasurer, without discount in two installments and received by the Treasurer at the East Montpelier Municipal Building as follows: The first installment will be due and postmarked on or before Friday, November 15, 2024 and the second installment will be due and postmarked on or before Thursday, May 15, 2025. Moved by Ms. Starr seconded by Mr. Morey. The Article **PASSED** by voice vote.

ARTICLE 6: Shall the Town raise the sum of **\$51,960** for Kellogg-Hubbard Library for the support of the Kellogg-Hubbard Library. Sarah Swift noted that the higher ask is due to increase in benefits for staff and due to flooding. The basement is being rebuilt in a way that mitigates further flood damage. The Article **PASSED**: 719 YES 265 NO

- ARTICLE 7: Shall the Town raise the sum of **\$4,500** for the Four Corners Schoolhouse Association for operating expenses during fiscal year 2025. Moved by Ms. Farrington, seconded by Ms. Knoedler. Rachael Grossman thanked the town for the funding to match the grant they received. Mold mitigation is scheduled to occur this spring and summer. The Article **PASSED** by voice vote.
- ARTICLE 8: Shall the Town raise the sum of **\$12,000** for the East Montpelier Signpost to provide for the production and mailing of six issues of the *East Montpelier Signpost* for each East Montpelier resident household and non-resident property owner during fiscal year 2025. Moved by Mr. Morey and seconded by Ms. Grossman. Ms. Knoedler thanked the Signpost staff. Charlotte Staples asked why they continue to ask for funding if there is adequate funding in the account. Ms. Grossman, Treasurer, explained that town funding does not come until December. The Signpost tries to keep two years' worth of operating schedule in their budget. Ann Stanton noted that no money was requested for a year during the pandemic. The costs of paper and postage have risen, and the group is trying to budget conservatively. The motion **PASSED**.
- ARTICLE 9: Shall the Town raise the sum of **\$4,000** for East Montpelier Trails, Inc. for the enhancement, development, administration and maintenance of the trail network in East Montpelier during fiscal year 2025. Moved by Rebecca Reed, seconded by Ed Deegan. Mr. Deegan sees the trail system as a huge benefit of the community. He urged support due to the use of the trails and the wear and tear caused by climate change. Loring Starr, echoed Mr. Deegan. She thanked the "trail fairies" who cleared the trails anonymously. Nona Estrin suggested checking with landowners before cutting fallen trees. The motion **PASSED** by voice vote.
- ARTICLE 10: Shall the Town raise the sum of **\$9,700** for the Montpelier Senior Activity Center for operating expenses during fiscal year 2025. Moved by Doug Kievit-Kylar and seconded by Flor Diaz Smith. The motion **PASSED** by voice vote.
- ARTICLE 11: Shall the Town raise the sum of **\$6,000** for Twin Valley Seniors, Inc. for operating expenses during fiscal year 2025. Moved by Celina Moore seconded by Ginny Callan. The motion **PASSED** by voice vote.
- ARTICLE 12: Shall the Town raise the sum of **\$6,500** for Central Vermont Home Health & Hospice for operating expenses during fiscal year 2025. Moved by Lindy Biggs, seconded by Thomas Brazier. The motion **PASSED** by voice vote.
- ARTICLE 13: Shall the Town raise the sum of **\$7,834** for the support of Rural Community Transportation, Inc. (RCT) to provide services to residents of the Town of East Montpelier, including \$6,834 as its RCT portion of the fiscal year 2025 share of the annual ongoing cost of providing the commuter bus service along Route 2 with service into East Montpelier and \$1,000 as its fiscal year 2025 share of the annual ongoing cost of providing the commuter bus service along Routes 14 & 15 with service into East Montpelier. This appropriation funds a portion of the total cost of the service, which will also be supported by appropriations from other towns, State and Federal funds, and rider fares. Moved by Ms. Grossman seconded by Ms. Reed. Margaret Grant asked if the transportation agency is planning to go up County Road. Mr. Gardner did not have the ridership information available. Mr. Etnier said RCT starts new route slowly by beginning a commuter van. If ridership increases, they may consider establishing a route. There was discussion regarding the coordination between the two agencies that provide transportation. Ms. Callan spoke about Go For Vermont that provides transportation with EVs. Ms. Starr spoke to the portion of the service shown in Article 15. The motion **PASSED** by voice vote.
- ARTICLE 14: Shall the Town raise the sum of **\$1,499** as its Green Mountain Transit portion of the fiscal year 2025 share of the annual ongoing cost of providing the commuter bus service along Route 2 with service into East Montpelier. This appropriation funds a portion of the total cost of the service, which will also be supported by appropriations from other towns, State and Federal funds, and rider fares. Moved by Ms. Carpenter, seconded by Ms. Reed. Mr. Thompson asked why the numbers are

not even numbers? Mr. Thompson proposed to add \$1 to this article for \$1,500. The amendment **PASSED** by voice vote. The AMENDED motion **PASSED** by voice vote.

Motion made by Julie Potter, seconded by Ms. Watson. Ms. Ashley asked why we are giving money to GMT again. Mr. Gardner responded that the amount in this segment is for senior center transportation and appointments. Ms. Carpenter thanked the Funding Study Committee and reminded us that these organizations are run mostly by volunteers. Mr. Charles Johnson was pleased that Youth First Mentoring changed their name. Mr. Gardner explained that the funding study committee vets every request. Mr. Etnier reviewed the process that funding Articles move through to meet the criteria of being on the ballot. The organizations in Articles 6 through 14 have presented to the Selectboard because of the larger amounts requested. Mr. Morey asked why the VT Bar Association has 10% of the budget and what they do. Mr. Erlbaum responded that the VT Bar Association funds legal aid with this donation. Mr. Nathan Phillips saw that this served many residents this year. Diana Fielder thanked residents for their support for the Onion River Food Shelf. The

hours are now 9am – 2 p.m on Wednesdays. Mr. Donald Welch reminded the audience why we now vote on the Article this way. Mr. Dave Stanton talked about how this lumped together. Liz Benjamin asked if the Signpost could have articles about these organizations. Carol Dickson asked what happens if the \$25,000 cap is reached. Mr. Gardner suggested that any appropriations would need to be kept under the cap. If the request is large enough, it will be moved out as a separate article. The cap used to be \$10,000. In the early part of the century, it was raised to \$25,000. The motion **PASSED** by voice vote.

ARTICLE 16: To transact any other business that may properly come before the meeting.

Ms. Carpenter, representing the Friends of Coburn Pond, told the audience they would be starting a fundraiser. Members participate in Green Up and with Winooski River clean up. Look for their new web page coming soon.

Steven Miracle reported that the Energy Committee is working on compliance for Act 174 and meeting the determination of Energy Compliance as outlined in the Town Plan. There will be opportunities for public comment.

Patty Giavara, member of Emergency Preparedness Committee, goal is to be ready to help ourselves and neighbors during natural disasters. The group collaborates with Calais to learn how they can work together and attend training with them. There are handouts on the table outside the gym. Ms. Estrin thanked the East Montpelier Postmaster for doing his best throughout the recent months to keep mail delivery going.

Ms. Miller requested more involvement in the scheduling of the school and town informational meetings. Currently, the school overlaps with the town. She feels that this discourages involvement in both meetings.

Ms. Grossman noted that some towns hire community nurses. The State may be funding those positions in the future. She would like the Selectboard to investigate that.

Special thanks to Sue Racanelli for organizing the lunch potluck for the last ten years. A call for a volunteer for next year was made.

The Planning Commission is conducting a survey for the Town Plan. A paper copy of the survey is available on the handout table outside the gym and at the town office after Town Meeting.

Mr. Deegan thanked the town's volunteers, staff and selectboard for their work. He suggested that the town increase the Selectboard stipend next year due to the amount of work required.

Abby Jenne, of the Central Vermont Economic Development Corporation requested permission to speak. She reviewed free resources and support for businesses and entrepreneurs available through her organization.
